



COMMANDING OFFICER

Captain D. A. FRANZ, U. S. Navy, Commanding Officer of the USS DE HAVEN (DD-727), was promoted to his present rank on 1 October 1967.

Captain FRANZ, a native of Adams, Massachusetts, received his commission in the United States Navy in 1944 upon graduating from the Merchant Marine Academy. He served aboard the attack cargo ship USS ANDROMEDA (AKA-15) until 1946, following which he transferred to the inactive reserve and entered Renesselear Polytechnic Institute. He graduated in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mechanical Engineering. During this same year, he was also promoted to Lieutenant.

Upon recall to active duty, Captain FRANZ served as navigator on the attack transport USS NEW KENT (APA-214) and as Operations Officer on the amphibious command ship USS MOUNT OLYMPUS (AGC-8). He reported for duty to the Bureau of Naval Personnel in 1954 and later to Tufts University to further his studies in the field of Engineering. He next served as Executive Officer of the destroyer USS BORIE (DD-704). After instructing Naval Operations at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1960 to 1962, Captain FRANZ became a student again as he undertook postgraduate study in Navy Management at Monterey, California. His next assignment was as Commanding Officer, Military Sea Transportation Service, Manila, Republic of the Philippines.

Captain FRANZ assumed command of the USS DE HAVEN in June of 1966. During his tenure as Commanding Officer, DE HAVEN has steamed over 85,000 miles and fired over 22,000 rounds of naval gunfire support in Vietnam. The ship has participated in the rescue of pilots shot down while over Vietnam and as a rescue destroyer assigned to carriers operating in the Gulf of Tonkin.

Captain FRANZ is married to the former Emily Sommer of Adams, Massachusetts, and has two sons, Donald Jr., and Roger, and one daughter, Deborah.





EXECUTIVE OFFICER



Lieutenant Commander R. S. CUMMING, a native of Elkton, Md., received his commission in 1954 from Officer Candidate School after graduating from Oglethorpe University with a BS in biological science. He served aboard USS KNAPP (DD-653) after graduating from CIC Officer School. He next attended the COMCRUDESPAC Engineering School and then served as Engineering Officer of the USS BUCK (DD-761). In 1959 he was assigned as Aide and Flag Lieutenant to COMINEPAC and was then transferred to Commander Operational Development Force as Aide and Flag Lieutenant. His assignment as Commanding Officer, USS LIPAN (ATF-85) gave Lieutenant Commander CUMMING his first afloat command homeported in Pearl Harbor. Lieutenant Commander CUMMING was then assigned to Commander U. S. Military Assistance Command Vietnam as Staff Operations and Plans Officer. It was during this period that he was awarded the Bronze Star with combat V and CINCPACFLT Commendation along with the Republic of Vietnam Honor Medal First Class. From Vietnam he reported to USS DE HAVEN (DD-727), homeported in Yokosuka, Japan, and was awarded the Navy Commendation Medal for his performance of duties as Navigator during DE HAVEN shore bombardment missions in the Republic of Vietnam.





A LOOK INTO HISTORY

The United States Ship DE HAVEN (DD-727) was commissioned in March 1944 as the second destroyer to bear the name of Lieutenant Commander E. J. DeHaven, an early arctic explorer. The first DE HAVEN (DD-496) was destroyed and sunk as a result of enemy action in 1943. The present DE HAVEN also saw action in World War it in operations at Leyton Gulf, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa.


DE HAVEN was on station in the Far East when South Korea was invaded in 1950. assisted in the evacuation of American N. tionals from Inchon on the second day of the war. Hier crew received the honored Navy Unit Commendation Medal for action in Inchon in support of amphibious operations. Throughout the Korean War the ship completed four combat tours and participated in carrier operations, amphibious stopest, coastal blockade, and naval gunfire support of troops at the front.

Since the Korean conflict, DE HAVEN has continued to play an active role to PACIFIC FLEFT operations. She has been awarded the Armed Forces Expeditionar Medal for

operations in the Que mon-Ma'su area, the Taiwan Straits and Vietnam. Di has participated in carrier task group operations and performed radar picket and surveillance tracking assignments because out the Western Pacific.


During the Vietnam crisis, DE HAVEN has served as a Naval Gunfire Support Cont in I, II, IV Corps and Rung Saat Special areas. She has served as a Search and Rescue Unit on North SAR Station, on Sea Dragon operations off the coast. of North Vietnam, and as rescue destroyer on attack carrier operations. In this time DE HAVEN has fired over 22,000 naval gunfire rounds in support of friendly troops and in North Vietnam. The ship has also participated in the rescue of four pilots downed off the coast of North Vietnam.

A SUMNER-class destroyer, DE HAVEN has a displacement of 2670 tons, a length of 376'6" and a beam of 40'6". She went through the Fleet Rehabilitarion and Modernization Program (FRAM) 1966 resulting in a greatly increased antisubmarine capability. In addition to her main battery of six 5" 48 guns, carries eight ASW toepedo tubes, and two Drone Anti-Submarine Helicopters (DASH). She can steam 8,000 miles whould refueling and, with a total horsepower of 60,000, is capable of a maximum speed of 13 knots.

A LOOK INTO HISTORY

Her crew received the honored Navy Unit Commendation Medal for action in Inchon in support of amphibious operations. Throughout the Korean War the ship completed four combat tours and participated in carrier operations, amphibious support, coastal blockade, and naval gunfire support of troops at the front.

Since the Korean conflict, DE HAVEN has continued to play an active role in PACIFIC FLEET operations. She has been awarded the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for

operations in the Que mon-Matsu area, the Taiwan Straits and Vietnam. DE HAVEN has participated in carrier task group operations and performed radar picket and surveillance tracking assignments throughout the Western Pacific.


During the Vietnam crisis, DE HAVEN has served as a Naval Gunfire Support Unit in I, II, III, IV Corps and Rung Saat Special areas. She has served as a Search and Rescue Unit on North SAR Station, on Sea Dragon operations off the coast of North Vietnam, and as rescue destroyer on attack carrier operations. In this time DE HAVEN has fired over 22,000 naval gunfire rounds in support of friendly troops and in North Vietnam. A SUMNER-class destroyer, DE HAVEN has a displacement of 2670 tons, a length of 376'6" and a beam of 40'6". She went through the Fleet Rehabilitation and Modernization Program (FRAM) in 1960, resulting in a greatly increased anti-submarine capability. In addition to her main battery of six 5" 38 guns, she now carries eight ASW torpedo tubes, and two Drone Anti-Submarine Helicopters (DASH). She can steam 8,000 miles without refueling and, with a total horsepower of 60,000, is capable of a maximum speed of 33 knots.

THE FIRST DE HAVEN (DD-496)



Just four months and eleven days after she was commissioned on September 21, 1942, the United States Destroyer DE HAVEN (DD-496) was part of Captain Briscoe's "Cactus Striking Force" escorting LST's to a landing at Verahue Beach. On February 1, 1943, they were discovered by a group of enemy aircraft. The force lacked fighter cover of American planes and were exposed to a cyclone of enemy planes. The ship's clock timed the attack at 1457. Down came the lightning as six of the planes plummeted on the target destroyer. DE HAVEN's antiaircraft batteries rattled, banged, and flamed, smearing the sky with flak. The ship was able to stop 3 of the bombers, but was hit squarely with three bombs. The planes winged away to report another United States warship on the bottom of "Ironbottom Bay". A total of 167 of the ship's company perished with the ship, including her Captain and ten of her Officers. The USS DE HAVEN (DD-496) was the 15th destroyer to be lost in the Guadalcanal campaign.




UNDER CONSTRUCTION

LCDR E. J. DeHaven became a wellknown explorer through his wide travels and expeditions. Appointed Midshipman on 2 Oct. 1829, he was commissioned Lieutenant on 8 Sept 1841. His early service was recorded in the West Indies and in South America onboard the ships NATCHES, ERIE, and the LEXINGTON. After a tour of shore duty in New York and Baltimore, Lt. DeHaven was transferred to the FALMOUTH in the Pacific and in 1839 to the USS VINCENNES, flagship of the U.S. Exploration Expedition under Charles Wilkes. On this vessel, Lt. DeHaven made his cruise to the Atlantic and among the Pacific Islands. He was transferred to the USS PEACOCK in October 1840, which continued with the expedition in surveying portions of the Pacific and the North American Court near Puget Sound. On 18 July 1841 the PEACOCK was wrecked in the mouth of the Columbia River, and Lieutenant Commander DeHaven finished the cruise of the expedition on the OREGON. During 1843 he served aboard USS TRUXTON and in January 1845 was transferred to the USS SOMERS. The SOMERS was active in the Gulf of Mexico during the early part of the trouble with Mexico, and participated in the first expedition against Alvarado. On 3 May 1850, LCDR DeHaven was placed in

command of the Grinnell Rescue Expedition to search for Sir John Franklin and to make further scientific expeditions. Two ships of the expedition, the brigs ADVANCE and RESCUE, were caught in the ice west of Greenland in September and drifted for nine months. The Expedition failed to find Franklin, but discovered and named Grinnell Land. Lieutenant Commander DeHaven retired on 6 February 1862, and died on 1 May 1865.

WORLD WAR II

DE HAVEN was on radar picket station on 15 August 1945 when the Japanese accepted unconditional surrender. On 1 September she embarked Rear Admiral John Shafroth for transportation to Tokyo Bay, and the next day anchored 1500 yards off the bow of the USS MISSOURI during the signing of the surrender.






DOWN TOWN





















NAVAL GUN FIRE SUPPORT





The DASH Weapons System enables a destroyer to extend its armament to an enemy submarine well away from the ship. The unmanned drone helicopter is equipped with two antisubmarine torpedoes and has a range of about thirty miles. On June 2, 1967, five officers from the Japanese Maritime Self Defense Force completed three days of intensive training with the DASH weapons system and crew.
