

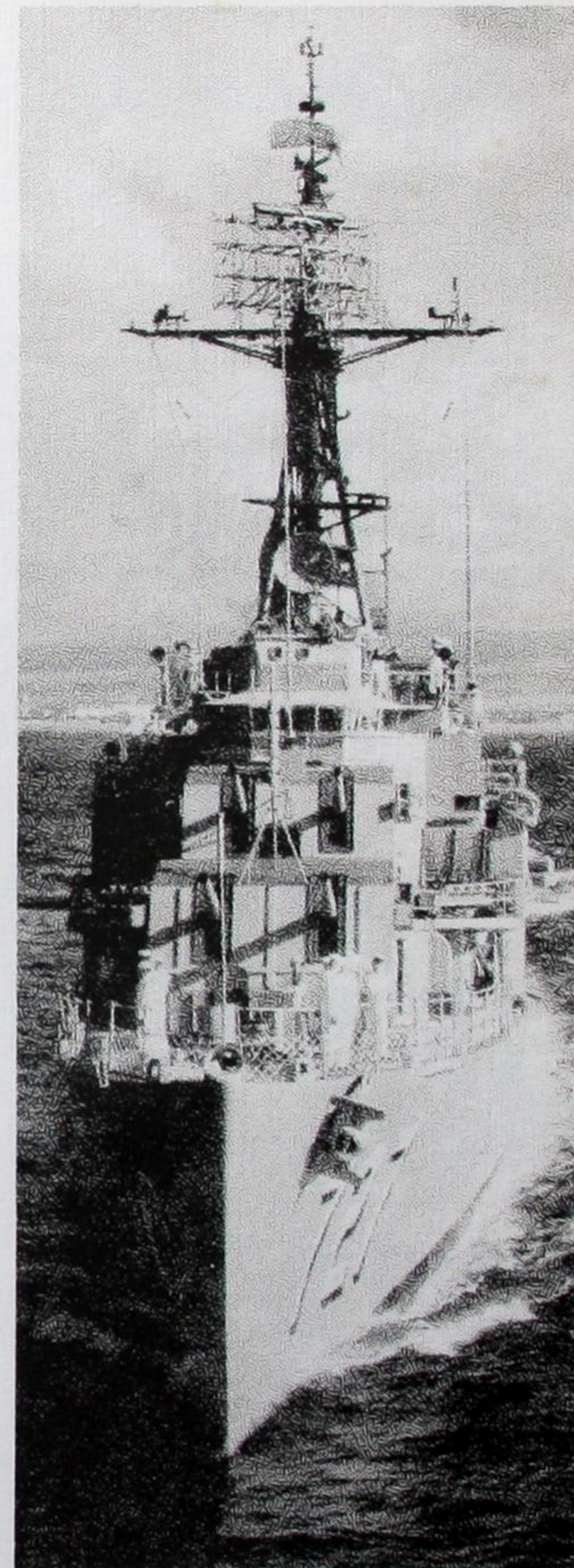

## A Brief History

UNITED STATES SHIP DE HAVEN (DD-727) was commissioned 31 March 1944, the second destroyer to bear the name of Lieutenant Commander E.J. De Haven, an early Arctic explorer. The first DE HAVEN (DD-496) was sunk in February 1943 as a result of Japanese dive bombers in a battle near Guadalcanal. Soon after her sea trials and training the present DE HAVEN became a distinguished performer in war zone operations at Leyte Gulf, Luzon, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. She is credited with destroying several air and small surface craft and was also in Tokyo Bay with the USS MISSOURI during the signing of the surrender.

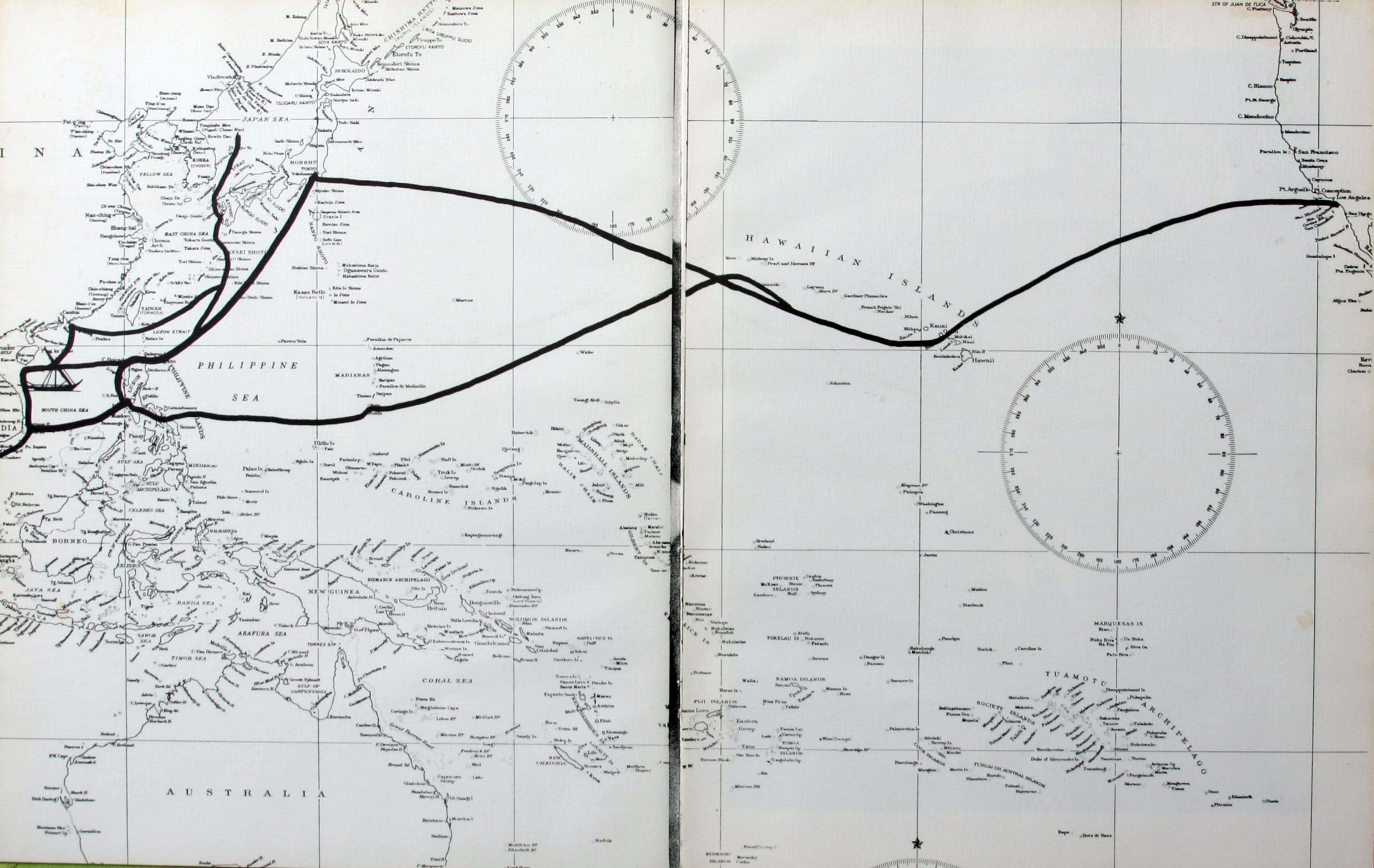
DE HAVEN continued her active career during the Korean campaign. She evacuated American Nationals from Inchon on the second day of the war and completed four combat tours of carrier operations, amphibious support, coastal blockade and naval gunfire support of troops on the front. The ship was awarded a Navy Unit Commendation for amphibious support operations at Inchon.

The peacetime role of destroyers was equally brought out by the DE HAVEN following the Korean conflict. Port visits promoting goodwill and People-to-People Programs, radar picket and surveillance assignments, and training were conducted throughout the Western Pacific. DE HAVEN was also awarded the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for operations in the Quemoy-Matsu area, the Taiwan Straits and Vietnam.

During the more recent Vietnam crisis, DE HAVEN has served in varied assignments as a naval gunfire support unit in I, II, III, IV Corps and Rung Saat Special area of South Vietnam, as an interdiction unit on Operation Sea Dragon in North Vietnam, as a search and rescue unit on North SAR Tonkin Gulf, and as a rescue destroyer on carrier operations. Throughout these missions, DE HAVEN has fired over 25,000 rounds of naval gunfire in support of friendly troops in South Vietnam and in interdiction in North Vietnam. The ship has also participated in the rescue of downed aviators from the Tonkin Gulf off the coast of North Vietnam.

A SUMNER class destroyer, DE HAVEN displaces 2670 tons, has a length of 376'6". Modification of the ship in 1960 by the Fleet Rehabilitation and Modernization Program (FRAM) greatly increased the ship's anti-submarine capability. DE HAVEN carries a main battery of six 5 inch 38 caliber guns, six ASW torpedo tubes and two Drone Anti-submarine Helicopters (DASH). DE HAVEN can steam 5,000 miles without refueling and with 60,000 shaft horsepower is capable of a maximum speed of 33 knots.









## *Commander E.J. Casey, Jr., USN* Commanding Officer

Commander Casey was born in Boston, Massachusetts, in 1928, graduated from the Massachusetts Maritime Academy and was commissioned an Ensign in June 1949. He was serving aboard the USS SALEM (CA-139) at the outbreak of the Korean War. Additional duty stations included the USS BLOCK ISLAND (CVA-106), the Navy Postgraduate School at Monterey, California, Airborne Early Warning Squadron FOUR, USS OUTPOST (AGR-10), USS JOHN HOOD (DD-655) and the Fleet Weather Center, Pearl Harbor.

In April 1962, Commander Casey reported on board the USS BROWNSON (DD-868) as Executive Officer. He assumed duties as BROWNSON's Commanding Officer in June 1963. In April 1964 he was assigned to two years duty with the Operations Section of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Prior to reporting onboard DE HAVEN, Commander Casey served as Executive Officer on board the USS OKANOGAN (APA-220). His decorations include: Joint Service Commendation Medal, World War II Victory Medal, National Defense Medal with one bronze star, Navy Expeditionary Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

Commander Casey commanded DE HAVEN from 8 June 1968 to 15 January 1970. He is married to the former Elizabeth Hicks of Wynnewood, Pennsylvania. They presently reside with their five children; Edward, William, Harold, Margaret, and Caroline at Virginia Beach, Virginia.



## *Commander H.C. Morris, USN* Commanding Officer

Commander Morris was born in McCamey, Texas, in 1930, graduated from the University of Southern California and was commissioned an Ensign in June 1952. He was ordered to duty aboard USS BADOENG STRAIT (CVE-116), ultimately becoming the escort carrier's First Lieutenant. In April 1955, he was ordered to the destroyer USS WATTS (DD-567) as Gunnery officer. He served on that ship until June 1957, when he reported to the staff of the U.S. Fleet Sonar School, San Diego, California.

In July 1959, he was ordered as Executive Officer of the radar picket destroyer escort USS FINCH (DER-328). While on FINCH he made one picket as Commanding Officer. In August 1961, CDR Morris was assigned to the Bureau of Naval Personnel, Washington, D.C., as Assistant Head, Military Programs Section of the Officer Candidate Education and Training Branch, with principal duties in planning and administration of Naval Academy and NROTC midshipman summer training activities afloat and ashore.

After commanding USS MILLS (DER-383) from November 1964 to October 1966, CDR Morris served as Head, Surface Ordnance Section, Materiel Division, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, before reporting aboard DE HAVEN. His decorations include: China Service Medal, National Defense Medal with one star, Korean Service Medal with two stars, Antarctic Service Medal, United Nations Service Medal, Korean Presidential Unit Citation, and Vietnam Campaign Medal.

Commander Morris assumed command of DE HAVEN on 15 January 1970. He is married to the former Mary Margaret Baum of Pomona, California. They presently reside with their five children; Deborah, Clay, Mark, Patricia, and Milissa at Huntington Beach, California.





*LCDR P.D. Wertz, USN*  
Executive Officer



Lieutenant Commander Wertz was born in Mattapoisett, Massachusetts in 1937, graduated from S.E. Massachusetts university and was commissioned an Ensign in December 1958. After serving as auxiliaries officer aboard USS BEXAR (APA 237) he was ordered to Staff, Hawaiian Sea Frontier as Commanding Officer of the Flag Allowance.

In November 1962 he reported to USS KAWISHIWI (AO 146) as gunnery officer and navigator. Destroyer duty as operations officer and weapons officer aboard USS OZBOURN (DD 846) followed, and in November 1965 LCDR Wertz was ordered to postgraduate school in Monterey, California. Here he received a Masters Degree in Operations Research.

LCDR Wertz became executive officer of DE HAVEN in July 1968. His decorations include: Navy Achievement Medal, Navy Unit Citation, National Defense Medal, Republic of Vietnam Service Medal with four stars, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.
